As we reflect on the past year, I am filled with immense pride and gratitude for the incredible progress and achievements we have made together. Our journey has been marked by significant milestones that have strengthened our mission and expanded our impact.

In January 2024, our dedicated board and staff, along with insightful consultants, came together to update and write the Circle's next three-year strategic plan. This comprehensive plan will quide us as we continue to empower and support our community.

CIRCLE'S CONTINUOUS IMPROVEMENT: 2025 GOALS

On January 27, 2024, the Circle Program staff and Board of Directors met for a daylong retreat to create a new strategic plan for 2024 -2027. The meeting was facilitated by consultants Monica Zulauf and Elizabeth Beeson. The group identified key concerns and priorities for the next three years, which formed the basis for the strategic work plan. The core components of the plan are as follows:

FUNDRAISING AND RESOURCE DEVELOPMENT



Our focus on fundraising and resource development ensures Circle Program's sustainability, growth, and impact. By broadening the work of the Resource and Development Committee (RDC) and engaging in strategic fundraising efforts, we will secure the necessary financial resources to support our programs and services. Effective fundraising and board engagement are essential for the Circle Program to continue providing a safe and supportive environment for girls, expand our reach, and enhance our overall impact on the community.

PROGRAM AND SERVICES



Programs and services are a priority for the Circle Program as they directly impact our ability to fulfill our mission of empowering and enriching girls' lives. By focusing on enhancing mentorship programs, improving mentor recruitment and training, and expanding initiatives like the Teen Adventure Program and Eastward Bound, the Circle Program can provide valuable experiences and support to our participants. These programs not only help girls and teens build confidence, develop skills, and form lasting connections, but also contribute to their personal growth and community engagement. Prioritizing programs and services ensures that the Circle Program continues to offer impactful opportunities for girls to thrive and reach their full potential.



Circle Program was founded in 1993 by Onaway alumnae and trustees. They wanted to create a summer camp program for NH girls in need, but recognized the fact that just a few weeks at camp might not be enough to make a sustainable difference in their lives. They modeled Circle Program after the Mayhew Program for boys and combined a residential summer camp with year-round, one-on-one mentoring and monthly activities.



Mentorship Matters: The impact of positive role models

GROUP MENTORING

In 2024, Circle piloted a group mentoring program in addition to 1:1 mentoring, pairing girls with one or two mentors to strengthen connections and expand opportunities. While Circle's numbers for the 9 - 11 year old age group continues to grow, group mentoring is an innovative and equitable way to ensure each girl has access to a relationship with a mentor. For group mentors Rebekah "Reba" Lewis, and Lilly Taccetta, their connection began at Circle Camp where they formed a strong connection over their shared passion for social work. Reba and Lilly were paired with two sets of sisters from two different towns. This dynamic group of six enjoys getting together for activities like apple picking, movies, and crafts.

"I have really enjoyed group mentoring! Getting to see the true colors and personalities of all four girls has been an honor. I cherish the connection I have built, not only with our mentees, but with my co-mentor as well. We are able to problem solve together, bring different perspectives, and develop a great friendship. I love seeing the joy in the eyes of the airls when we come together. It feels like our own little support system!" - Reba Lewis





Two Sessions for Double the Impact

In 2024, Circle Program made the decision to split girls camp (9-11 year olds) into two separate sessions. In addition, the duration of girls camp went from three weeks to two. These changes allowed us to double our numbers for the youngest age group, and ensure the success of each girl during her camp experience.

2024 Camp Theme: TRADITIONS

Each summer, Circle camp is given a theme. This theme is reflected and discussed throughout the duration of camp through daily activities and storytelling. 2024's theme was TRADITIONS. Circle Program has a number of traditions that have been a part of the organization since the very beginning. Some of these traditions include giving campers and counselors gratitude stones at the end of the day, picking out your own hand made quilt your first year as a Circle camper, or singing familiar songs at meal times. Circle campers and staff know and love these traditions, but why are they so important? Circle traditions create a sense of comfort and belonging and bring campers, mentors, and staff closer together. As campers age through the

> program, the significance and positive emotions created by practicing Circle traditions becomes clear, making them more inclined to share them with mentors, friends, and family. 

In addition, offering teen camp as the first session allows our teens with summer jobs to work for the remainder of the summer, rather than pausing for camp in late July.

Teen Adventure Program: Mystic, CT

In 2024, Circle Program's high schoolers attended the second ever Eastward Bound trip. Historically, TAP's week long excursion has taken place the first week of August. In 2024, TAP was offered in late June to assist in the teen's summer employment schedules.

Day 1: The morning of the first day, TAP staff picked up campers and headed to their KOA in Mystic. Upon arrival, campers worked together to set up their tents and cook dinner. After dinner, everyone explored the amenities of their KOA which included a pool, tube slides, mini golf, a playground, and an inflatable jump pillow.

Day 2: After breakfast was made and lunches were packed, TAP headed to the Mystic Aquarium. They watched a seal show, touched stingrays and sharks, and learned about new creatures. The Beluga Whales put on a show and appeared in a group photo! Their next stop was the Roger Williams Zoo. The day was full of never before seen animals like zebras, elephants and monkeys.

Day 3: The morning was spent at the KOA swimming, playing mini-golf, and bouncing around on the bounce pillow. After lunch, TAP headed to the ropes course and zipline adventure park. There were squeals of joy, fears conquered, and leadership demonstrated.

Day 4: The last day in Mystic was spent exploring the Seaport Museum. At the Museum, TAP enjoyed a private showing at the Planetarium and a boat ride around the harbor. To end the trip, TAP enjoyed Mystic Pizza around the fire.

Day 5: After arriving back at Circle Camp, TAP showed photos and stories about their experience with teen campers so they could learn about what's in store for them in the near future. That afternoon, mentors arrived for fun around the fire. Campers shared their memories, pictures, and enjoyed s'mores with their mentors before heading home.

There are several impactful ways to support Circle Program beyond traditional cash donations.

These diverse methods of giving significantly enhance Circle Program's ability to achieve its mission.

- Legacy Donations: Bequests in wills or trusts allow donors to leave a lasting impact by designating a portion of their estate to Circle Program.
- Tax Credits: Certain donations may qualify for state or federal tax credits, reducing the donor's tax liability and incentivizing giving.
- . Donor-Advised Funds (DAFs): Provide a flexible way to manage charitable giving by allowing donors to recommend grants to Circle over time.
- Stock Donations: Enable donors to transfer appreciated securities directly to Circle Program, potentially avoiding capital gains taxes.
- <u>Planned Giving Options</u>: Charitable gift annuities or remainder trusts offer donors the opportunity to support Circle Program while receiving income or tax benefits during their lifetime.

2024 TREASURER'S REPORT

Your continued support of the Circle Program ensures that the girls we serve have access to meaningful mentorship and enriching summer camp experiences. Thanks to the generosity of our donors and supporters, along with the unwavering commitment of our volunteer mentors, Circle closed 2024 in a strong financial position.

Income and expenses are closely monitored through a detailed budgeting process, approved by the Circle's Board and regularly assessed by our Finance Committee throughout the year. In 2024, total contributions and outside support for program needs amounted to \$787,434, which covered operating expenses of \$701,172 and resulted in an operating surplus. Positive cash flow from programming will, in large part, be utilized this spring and fall to address critical capital improvements and equipment needs at the program's summer camp. These measures support the long-term sustainability of our summer camp program.

Circle closed its fiscal year on December 31, 2024, with a nearly 9% increase in total assets to reach \$3,857,705 (unadjusted). Circle holds much of its liquidity, cash and cash equivalents, in a money market fund with Charles Schwab. We maintain our investment accounts with DL Carlson Investment Group. Investment performance is consistently monitored by our Investment Committee and communicated to the Circle's Board throughout the year. The market performance in 2024 was exceptionally strong, resulting in \$187,365 in endowment growth and a 13.31% time-weighted return. After program appropriations, Circle's endowment closed the year at \$1,537,859.

The Circle Program is a financially responsible nonprofit organization with much work to do in the coming year. We look forward to it and thank you for continuing to support Circle's mission of empowering New Hampshire's girls through camp and mentorship.



TUITION ENDOWMENTS

Over the years, individuals and family members have created named endowment funds in support of annual tuition to cover the cost for girls/youth and teens to attend Circle Program. Those enrolled in Circle Program receive full subsidies for the expense of their participation. It costs approximately \$8,100 to support a girl or teen engaged in Circle Program for a full year – for their time at camp, all organized group activities throughout the school year, and Circle's 1:1 and small group mentoring program. This figure includes activity fees, camp supplies, food, travel, staffing, insurance, mentor training, reimbursements, professional development for our staff, and much more. We are grateful to those who generously contributed to these funds in 2024. The December 31st values for these endowment funds are listed above.


